After the Referendum:

Below is a summary of Richard Rohr's Daily Meditation's (From the Center for Action and Contemplation), for the days Oct 8th to 13th, **published last Saturday – the Day of the Referendum**: The theme for the week was **PROPHETIC HOPE**, which considering the result of the Referendum is very appropriate:

Sunday

Prophets are concerned above all with transformation and freedom of the heart, and then out of that free heart, the prophet says, "Listen." —Richard Rohr

Monday

We can look at the life of Jesus to see what God asks of us.... The world saw a veritable miracle unfolding before its very eyes as all sorts and conditions of women and men, rich and poor, slave and free, Jew and Gentile—all these came to belong in one fellowship, one communion. —Desmond Tutu

Tuesday

When we can imagine only one way to be happy, we don't recognize the fullness and possibilities of the moment. We collapse if our one way is taken away from us. That's the power of the prophets—to recognize that there is always another way for the promise to be fulfilled, another way for Divine Love to reach us.

—Richard Rohr

Wednesday

This is what Jesus did—face his world fully and honestly, not shying away from the suffering or the disquieting demands that it would make on him. We need a faith now that can help us face this world that we have made ... and help us find a way through and beyond it. —Margaret Swedish

Thursday

God seems to be calling us to suffer the whole of reality, to remember the good along with the bad. Perhaps that is the course of the journey toward new sight and new hope. —Richard Rohr **Friday**

AND HERE IS A REAL-LIFE EXAMPLE OF "PROPHETIC

HOPE" (applied to care for the environment but also applicable to our thirst for Reconciliation in Australia)

"We Are Still Here"

Generations come and generations go, but the earth never changes. The sun rises and the sun sets, then hurries around to rise again. The wind blows south, and then turns north. Around and around it goes, blowing in circles. Rivers run into the sea, but the sea is never full. Then the water returns again to the rivers and flows out again to the sea. —Ecclesiastes 1:4–7.

Theologian Randy Woodley reflects on how we can learn from the sustained hope of Indigenous communities of America:

Throughout Indian country, one phrase rings true. No matter where you go, "We are still here!"

We are still here. It may not seem like such a profound statement. At first, anyway. But given the numerous attempts at cultural assimilation and genocide that have decimated many Native American populations by 95 percent since 1492—and given that Indigenous people still have some of the worst living conditions on Turtle Island—the statement means a lot. "We are still here" speaks directly to the hope that remains in America's First Nations. In Indian country, any hope is good hope. This hope—sustained through poverty, racism, poor housing, chronic disease, and a host of other maladies—is not based on utopianism. The earned hope of which I speak is built on a spirituality of relationship with the land and with all living creation and on respect for elders who sacrificed to give the generations to follow them a future....

This very real hope recognizes that Earth endures and that we can still do enough to reverse the damage done. After all, the Earth is much stronger and more resilient than any human being. Although human beings are a part of the Earth, we may be the most expendable. This gives me pause—as well as a much longer view of our history and our future.

I think Mother Earth is going to be OK in the end. I just hope we will be here long enough to see it. Although it might make us feel pretty insignificant, another way to turn the phrase is this: "We are still here ... for now. But the Earth remains forever."






BREAK OPEN THE WORD

STATEMENT ON THE VOTE

Now that the referendum result is known, it's time to look forward rather than look back. There will be a time for looking back, but a cooling off period may be needed if we are to see more clearly. Now is the time to ask not how we got here but where this result leaves us as a nation, where we need to go from here and how we might get there.

One thing is clear: the nation is more divided than ever and in many ways. It's ironic that a process supposed to unite the nation has done just the opposite. There's an urgent need now to create a new kind of national unity, and that can't be left to the politicians, because there's more to this than politics. The task belongs to all of us.

A second thing is still clearer and more urgent: the search for reconciliation based on truth and justice must continue, even if the referendum process and result have made that more difficult. This too is something that can't be left to the politicians, because again there's more to it than politics.

After this result at Federal level, the focus will have to move to the States. But it will also have to move to non-government organisations like the Churches. The Australian Catholic bishops have spoken of the need for a new engagement with Indigenous peoples, and that now becomes more pressing. In the Archdiocese of Brisbane we will commit ourselves more resolutely to our Reconciliation Action Plan and keep asking what else we can do. Fine words and symbolic gestures are not enough.

The process leading to this vote has been a highly politicised slog that has changed Australia, and not for the better. Now the real work begins. It's up to all of us to ensure that what we do from here serves national unity and racial justice, because we'll never have the first unless we have the second.

Healing of Fr. Peyton (Story 2)



Fr. Patrick Peyton is well-known for his famous saying, "The family that prays together, stays together." He became known as the "Rosary Priest" because of his propagation of devotion to the Holy Rosary. What many do not know is that Fr. Peyton was himself a recipient of a beautiful miracle from Our Lady, through the praying of the Holy Rosary.

In 1938, just before he was about to be ordained to the priesthood, Fr. Peyton became very ill and was diagnosed with advanced Tuberculosis, which at that time was an incurable disease. He consecrated himself to Our Lady, begged for her intercession, and began devoutly praying the Rosary, upon the suggestion of his sister. To the surprise of his doctors, he was completely and miraculously cured! As a result of this miracle, he promised the Blessed Mother that he would spend the rest of his life promoting the Holy Rosary.
