ALSO, please read the following letter I sent out to all on email this week. It's really important for ALL members of our parish.

The letter:

NOTE: Just to clarify the following:— Maybe if you thought about answers to the following as if our church buildings and ways of doing things no longer existed. What if we were like the first disciples after Pentecost?

Hello my fellow Stafford Parishioners,

Easter Weekend is finished and society has returned to the "new" normal we are grappling with.

Another big change is due next week for you who have kids at school. I know our beloved QofA school has all in hand regarding that and that Nigel and the staff are ready to help in ensuring your child(ren)'s education continues to be catered for.

For <u>all of us</u>, life has changed dramatically in that we cannot gather together in our church building to celebrate the Word AND Eucharist every week. However, we are still gathering to celebrate Christ's presence among us in our Community and the Word each week using "ZOOM" at 8.30am each Sunday.

Realistically, this could be the "new" normal for a few months and there's a good chance that our "old" normal will never be the same again. Even if that's the case, in this Easter Season, we remember that we are the "same but different".

We are a community **united by the Holy Spirit and whose mission is to proclaim the Good News**. HOW TO DO THAT in faithfulness to all our Ancestors in faith and to those whose life situation is much more onerous than ours. Think of our fellow Christians who are persecuted because of their faith in China, Myanmar, and some middle eastern countries. Think of those who have <u>never</u> been able to celebrate Eucharist <u>every</u> week such as those in the Amazon.

The answer to that depends on the "vineyard" we are

living in and will change according to times and circumstances.

I believe it's <u>really important</u> that we let go of the "old" normal, recognise our grief at its passing, and with faith and trust in the Holy Spirit, actively pray and reflect on how we can adapt in these new circumstances. (Let's **keep it local** with what our own parish can do alone or with others.

We have been ground breakers in many areas the in the past (e.g. the first parish to have a Parish Council, one of the first parishes to welcome Vietnamese Boat People in the "70s, the first to offer accommodation to the current Asylum Seekers in a convent, the first parish to have a "Laudato Si" forum – having more people enrol than the Archdiocese of Melbourne when it had one, and so on). Let's continue to give example, "leave our boats behind" and inspire others in what we do.

The four signposts we use to discern the readiness of an Adult to be Baptised are: WORD, WORSHIP, COM-MUNITY and SERVICE.

How, in these **new circumstances**, do we ensure the **WORD** is proclaimed and reflected on amongst all of us?

How, in these new circumstances, do we gather as the Body of Christ, whether we live alone or with others and **WORSHIP** – especially on the Day of the Lord, Sunday but also on other days?

How, in these new circumstances, do we live as **COM-MUNITY**, a sign to the world of how God wants all of God's children to live together – here there is a special challenge – How do we reach those without any 'online' presence?

How, in these new circumstances, do we be a people of **SERVICE**? How to we truly support e.g. those in need in our local neighbourhood and our brothers and sisters who continue to suffer in our world, Asylum Seekers, People who speak up for justice and, of course our Mother Earth?

BIG questions!! You are all GIFTED with the SPIRIT. You are all equal members of the Church with different Gifts. DON'T FORGET TO CONSULT WITH THE KIDS (AND ESPECIALLY TEENS AND YOUNG ADULTS – they too are "church" and gifted with the Holy Spirit!)

Send me your ideas – **NOT** for me to do them all but to be a **conduit**, a **catalyst** whereby WE all can be '**CHURCH'** in the world.




