WENTIETH SUNDAY IN ORDINARY TIME

Isa 56:1,6-7; Rom 11:13-15,29-32; Matt 15:21-28

The first reading (Isa 56:1,6-7) comes from the part of the book concerning life after the Babylonian exile. There were conflicting ideas concerning the destiny of Jerusalem and matters of racial and religious purity. This pericope is remarkable for its openness, for righteous and God-fearing Gentiles would be able to offer sacrifices in the new temple, the house of prayer for all peoples.



The reading appears to have been chosen to accompany the gospel (Matt 15:21-28), which tells of the faithful Canaanite (or Greek Syrophoenician in Mark) woman who begged Jesus to heal her daughter. The encounter does not disclose a clear belief in Israel's God, nor any desire to join Jerusalem's temple worship, but she has faith in Jesus' ability to help. According to Matthew she calls him by the messianic title Son of David, which in Matthew is used mainly by foreigners and the blind. It later gives way completely to the title Son of God (used by the disciples last Sunday) by those mocking Jesus on the cross, but finally in faith by the presumed foreigners, the centurion and his company. Although Matthew's gospel is written for Jewish believers and appears to have exclusively Jewish concerns, foreigners are surprisingly privileged in it, first signified by the visiting Gentile wise men, the Magoi. Matthew presents Jesus as the fulfilment of Isaiah: during the cleansing of the temple, Matthew, Mark and Luke have Jesus cite Isaiah, calling it a house of prayer for all peoples, but Matthew alone has Jesus say in apparent reference to his own ministry that there is something greater than the temple here (Matt 12:6); Jesus prophesises its destruction (24:2), and is later accused of claim-

ing he would destroy and rebuild it in three days (26:61; 27:40); as the last act of this gospel the risen Lord Jesus sends the eleven to make disciples of all nations.

On this point all three readings today converge: in the second reading (Rom 11:13-15, 29-32), Paul credits his being sent to the Gentiles to the failure of other Jews to receive the Gospel. This may appear to contradict the commissioning, seeming to indicate turning to the Gentiles only because of the failure of the Jews. Instead, we note it is said only of Paul's ministry, for he went first to the Jews and only later to the Gentiles. Bearing in mind what was said last Sunday, note that this does not constitute rejection of the Jews, neither by Paul nor by God. Rather Paul hopes the success among the Gentiles will goad the Jews to beneficial jealousy. He is the only New Testament author to use this unusual verb, three of the four instances being in this letter and all for the same purpose. Instead of being considered a vice, this jealousy or envy can stimulate to personal betterment, just as athletes are goaded to improvement by the successes of competitors. Paul portrays Jewish reticence as having a positive benefit, one to make their eventual conversion more joyous. Perhaps careful attention to Paul may have helped avoid past atrocities against Jews, and attention to both Paul and history may help circumvent a return to anti-Jewish sentiment, but there are worrying signs of this rising again. For those of us who are Christians there should be the reminder that just as all nations are to be blessed in Abraham (Gen 12:3; 18:18; 22:18; 26:4; 28:4; Acts 3:25 and Gal 3:8), knowledge of God having been held by the Jews in trust for all people, so also Christ's entrusting us with the proclamation of the kingdom does not give us an exclusive claim to heaven so much as the privilege of bearing it for the benefit of all, as he did the cross. in the relevant basket.

- 3) With your tickets, go to the Marshal standing in the doorway to be 'ticked off' (for the Contact Tracing Sheet)
- 4) Sanitise your hands
- 5) Go to your seats and introduce yourself to those around—maintaining the 1.5m social distance.

If you HAVE NOT booked (and there are seats available):

- 1) Go to the relevant table at the front doors (Tables are marked e.g. A-G for family names beginning with those letters)
- 2) Collect a "CONTACT TRACING REGISTER" and fill out your required contact details for all members of your family present (acknowledging you're not sick, haven't been in contact with COVID symptoms etc)
- 3) Return to the table and (if there are any seats left) be allocated a seat. NOTE: if there are no seats available, you must return home as we are only permitted a maximum of 100 persons counting those inside and, if any, outside.
- 4) Deposit your cash or envelope donation in the basket
- 5) Go to the Marshal for them to write in your name and seat allocation.
- 6) Sanitise your hands and go to your allocated seat.
- 7) Please remember to book for the next time.

LINKS for all our Masses are available in the <u>CURRENT</u> newsletter ONLY (SEE BELOW—published on our website on Thursdays). (In my videos, I used the newsletter for the 18th Sunday in Ordinary Time which was the weekend of 1st/2nd August -- the LINKS IN THIS NEWSLETTER ARE NOW OUTDATED AND WILL NOT WORK ANYMORE.) PLEASE only use the CURRENT NEWSLETTER (this one) for booking weekday and weekend masses. e.g. If I wish to book a seat for the weekend 15th/16th August, I must use THIS Newsletter for this Weekend 8th/9th August. You need also to use the same newsletter for the next week's Weekday liturgies (Monday 10th to Friday 14th August).

THE NEW DEADLINE (starting next Sunday 16th August) for booking seats at masses are as follows.

ALL Bookings for ALL MASSES

- OPEN from MIDDAY the SUNDAY after the newsletter is published (e.g. for the Masses on the weekend 15/16 August and for the preceding weekdays (Monday 10th to Friday 14th August), the relevant LINKS will be in THIS newsletter published on the 6th August and bookings will open THIS Sunday 9th at Midday)and
- bookings will CLOSE on WEDNESDAY 3PM. (In this example, that's Wednesday 12th August)

 $(\underline{NO}$ bookings either by phone or on-line will be accepted after that.) -- If you tend to have problems booking for the weekends, please try on Sunday or Monday so that you can get our help before 3pm Tuesday and Debra or I will assist you with your bookings.

I have made a couple of videos about how to book

your seat (s) -- these videos will be updated if we change the current procedure but at present they are relevant if you are having troubles. NOTE: disregard the end of the videos talking about managing or changing your bookings -- there are a couple of problems that haven't been addressed. AND disregard the "Closing Time" I speak about as it has now changed - see above.)

Social Justice Corner

Each year on 30 July, organisations and communities committed to human rights mark the World Day Against Trafficking in Persons. Many religious orders provide support and advocacy services for people who become victims of trafficking, and in Australia they form a network called ACRATH (Australian Catholic Religious Against Trafficking in Humans). Our parish sells ACRATH calendars each year at Christmas time as a way of supporting this work.

Below is a summary of some recent practical initiatives that ACRATH have completed:

- Provide training programs and workshops around Australia for teachers and child protection workers, to provide safe referral pathways for young women in forced marriages or facing a forced marriage.
- Support ACRATH Companions to assist trafficked women.
 - Offer teachers from around Australia a webinar

introduction to human trafficking.

- Develop posters for distribution to schools and parishes in WA, to promote slavery-free supply chains and support for garment workers.
- Connect with overseas workers, to keep them updated on COVID-19 regulations and other important health information and support services.
