P eflection on the readings

Jonah is a delightful novella best read in its entirety. It speaks of God's compassionate response to the penitent, but with sinful foreigners as the role models of repentance the story is also a rebuke against the obstinacy of the people of Jerusalem and Israel who do not listen to the prophets. Due to its length, though not very long, reading the whole needs to be done outside the liturgy, but it is beneficial to encourage people to read and reflect upon it in order to prepare for this Sunday. The excerpts we read today stress the swiftness of the Ninevites' reaction: Jonah does not have good news for them but proclaims simply, in effect, "You will be destroyed"; they believe him, and they repent in fasting and in sackcloth. Then we hear the oft-repeated statement (but more often forgotten by critics of the Old Testament's so-called angry God): God relented and did not do what he had threatened.



In today's gospel (Mark 1:14-20) the public ministry of Jesus begins, but there are significant contrasts with Jonah: Jesus proclaims good news, saying "The kingdom of God has come", inviting the people to repent, to change their minds or ways. But will they? Unlike the Ninevites, and too much like the Jerusalemites whom the book of Jonah was apparently written against, we know that at Jerusalem he will, like prophets of old, be rejected and killed-but of course not by all. Later in the novella Jonah, with a disregard for the lives of the Ninevites and an overinflated regard for his own reputation as a truth-teller, takes umbrage at God's relenting ways; taking himself to the shade of a shrub, he cares more about it than the innocents in the city. Contrariwise, Jesus rejoices in the message he proclaims, that God is near and compassion has arrived; he delights more over repentant sinners than in the righteous who feel no need to repent; he takes no offence when sinners change, but will himself become the protective shade to those who seek shelter in his cross. Jesus, rather than flee his mission as Jonah in his story had attempted to do, embraces his work with vigour, and immediately he begins recruiting others to assist so that even more may be sent to the great work. Thus, rather than following the usual pattern of the first reading directly supporting the day's gospel, Jonah is employed as a contradictory parallel.

The Lectionary's second readings more often than not have little directly in common thematically with either the gospel or first reading. Today, however, there is some convergence as the second reading (1 Cor 7:29-31) opens in effect with the message, "The end is nigh". But rather than being alarmed, Paul's hearers are to look forward to it. Others fearing the end of the world experience distress, whereas the Christian message means more completion than destruction. There had sometimes been misunderstanding over these ideas, however, and it took some years before they realised that they had perhaps confused the advent of the Kingdom with the end of time. This reading discloses something of an expectation that the world will end soon, especially in the advice to live as if unmarried, in effect to cease propagating the species. The other advice about not being engrossed in or snagged by the ways of the world that will end, by which is meant human rule, is more easily interpreted in the other understanding, that is, that the world of waywardness will end; God's will will rule.

COVID Update for Parishes as at Monday 11th January 2020



The occupancy of Churches has been reduced to 1 person per 4 square metres during this time. Churches may open for Masses but **face masks must be worn** by everyone in attendance.

The presider is required to wear a mask upon entering and exiting the Church. You may remove the mask as you begin Mass.

It is recommended that parishes have a supply of masks available for parishioners who may arrive without one. Parishioners who refuse to wear a mask are not allowed to enter unless they are a child under 12 years old or a person affected by a medical condition or disability. (We will have a supply of masks here for anyone that arrives unprepared for the current restrictions)

The Body of Christ should continue to be administered only in the hand and the chalice should be received by the celebrant alone. Avoid direct physical contact where possible and limit contact to hands.

Funerals and weddings may have a maximum of 100 attendees.

No visitors are permitted to aged care facilities, disability accommodation services, correctional facilities, or hospitals (with the exception of an end of life visit for a patient) through 22 January.

In the parish office, masks only need to be worn in the office when a distance of 1.5 metres cannot be main-tained.


enten Program 2021 - 52 Daily Reflections

for Lent and Easter. Lent begins on 17th February, so start thinking about how you will journey through Lent and Easter Season in 2021.

Look to Jesus will nourish and nurture parishioner's prayer, spirituality and discipleship each day during Lent and into the first week of

Easter.

The daily reflections, written by Shane Dwyer, will invite the reader to contemplate a verse from the Scripture reading of the day. This reflection will be followed by a quote from Pope Francis and a simple prayer.



The daily reflections will only require 5-10 minutes for a person to read, reflect and pray. This Len-

ten practice will lead the reader into a deeper questioning and examination of their daily life. As they 'look to Jesus' – in their families, workplaces and the community – they will walk as 'missionary disciples' on the path to Easter, and beyond.

The resource:

a small book that is easy to carry, and read, while commuting or sitting at home (Cost is \$4)
daily reflections for Ash Wednesday to Good Friday, Easter Monday to the Second Sunday of Easter
for each day there is a double page spread with: the date; the day (eg Thursday of 2nd Week of Lent); a Scripture verse; a short reflection written by Shane Dwyer; a quote from Pope Francis; and a short prayer
introduction and 'how to use this book'

• at the back of the book there are suggestions for group use and questions for reflection and sharing

A euangelion, a 'gospel', a good message, is a message about something that alters the climate in which people live, changing the politics and the possibilities; it transforms the landscape of social life.

A **Pastoral Council** consists of the Pastor together with a group of parishioners chosen by the parish community. The Pastoral Council's role is to promote the Church's mission to live and communicate the love and values of Christ in our world. The Pastoral Council shares in the responsibility for the ongoing life and development of the faith community, working together with parishioners to provide support for their efforts to live as followers of Christ.

A group with a special role to play in Church life is the **Parish Finance Council**. Its purpose is to assist the Pastor in the administration of parish financial resources in order to carry out the mission of the parish. Members of the Parish Finance Council are appointed by the Pastor on the basis of their expertise in finance-related matters. The Parish Finance Council operates according to the guidelines set down by the diocese. It is a separate and distinct body from the Parish Pastoral Council as required by Canon 537.
